


A long time ago in 1809, a child by the name of Jean Gailhac was born in France.


In 1903, Mother Marie Joseph Butler, an RSHM, came to New York to open schools in New York City, Brooklyn, and the Bronx.


On February 2, 1926 Mother Butler opened Marymount Fifth Avenue with only 13 students.


